
# Olympia Garden Club Centennial

Mrs. Ishii learned Ikebana during the years they lived in Japan when John worked for the State Department. She became so Interested in it that she earned a teaching certificate in Ikebana at the Koryu School of Ikebana in Tokyo. While she lived in Japan, Ikebana International was organized and she became a charter member.

"It's a wonderful organization," she enthused. "There are chapters all over the world and I have sisters wherever I go. The theme of the group is 'friendship through flowers.' It is a positive way to work toward peace because people of all nationalities come together with a common interest in Ikebana."

When John accepted the position of advisor to the prime minister of Malaysia, and the family moved to that country, Ikebana provided, she said, a "magic door" through which they traveled, to meet and become friends with all sorts of interesting people.

"In Ikebana," she said, " you meet people of a special kind. They seem to be larger minded,














Retired WSU Extension agent Don Tapio tends future Christmas trees on his Rochester family farm.

Don Tapio, a retired WSU extension agent, once found himself without funds to continue his sophomore year at WSU. Thanks to a family friend, Elwood Walter Kalin Sr., a horticulture professor, Don received a scholarship from the Washington Federation of Garden Clubs. This allowed Don to continue his education.








